Maybe it's knowing the children by name and making them feel like they belong when they are in the church.

Also, in our church tradition, membership matters. Not for record keeping and numbers, (though some find that important) but for pastoral care reasons and to give folks a sense of belonging. Mother's Day is a reminder for many folks that they no longer have "genetic" family ties, so for them, the church is a place where they can feel connected and know they are loved. Thank you all for making this year's Mother's Day service such a special day of worship!
